

HAPPY THANKSGIVING November 28, 2019



On October 3, 1789 George Washington proclaimed the first Thanksgiving Day to be November 26. Some other presidents proclaimed Thanksgiving Day, but not always in November. During the Civil War, prompted by a series of editorials by Sarah Josepha Hale (editor of the popular Godey's Lady's Book), President Lincoln proclaimed a national Thanksgiving Day to be celebrated on the final Thursday of November (November 26, 1873). There were some deviations over the years, but in 1941 Congress passed a resolution making Thanksgiving a federal holiday on the fourth Thursday of November.

Christmas Traditions

In England in 1843, Sir Henry Cole and artist John Horsley created the first Christmas card as a way of encouraging people to use the new postal service. Advances in printing brought the price of cards down and by 1860 they became quite popular.




Holly and Ivy

Both holly and ivy were used in pre-Christian times to celebrate the winter solstice. As they provide a rare splash of color in the darkest month of the year, their popularity has survived.




Mistletoe

Hanging mistletoe was an ancient pagan practice adopted by early Christians. The tradition of kissing under the mistletoe originated in England. Each kiss required a berry to be plucked until none remained.



Christmas Carols

Carols were songs and dances of praise and joy in pagan times and the practice of carol singing carried over into the Christian era.



London sweet maker Thomas Smith invented Christmas crackers in the late 1840s, inspired by traditional, paper-wrapped French bonbons. Even though he included mottos and riddles inside each, it was not until he found a way to make them "crack" when pulled apart that sales took off. His sons later added hats and novelty gifts.




From the Spotlight of Palatine High School November, 1935



The Story Behind Clayson's New Trading Card

Clayson's new trading card may look familiar, like something you have seen before. If so, you are right! It's a takeoff on the iconic RCA dog, Nipper. As our mascot is a history buff and an inquisitive pup, he thought you might like to know the story of the dog and one of the most recognizable logos in the world.

Nipper was a small terrier found on the streets of Bristol, England, who was adopted by Marc Barraud, a

theater and set designer. He got his name because he had a habit of biting at people's ankles. After Barraud died in 1887, Nipper went to live with Marc's brother Francis, a painter who lived in London. Francis inherited Marc's phonograph and noticed that Nipper cocked his head and seemed to listen to the music.

In the 1890s, Francis created a painting of Nipper as he listened to the sound coming from the horn of the phonograph, which was he titled *His Master's Voice*, the idea being that Nipper missed his owner Marc and the sound he heard was that of his deceased owner. Nipper died in 1895.


With the growing popularity of this new sound recording technology, Barrud offered his painting to the Edison Bell Company whose executives could not see a benefit to sales since dogs don't listen to phonographs. The Gramaphone Company Ltd. of London adopted *His Master's Voice* as its trademark and in 1929 the American rights were acquired by RCA.

Nipper, the pet, became a marketing icon. The company also used the dog for other company products, letterheads and advertising and promotional materials. "Nipper" collectibles are still sought after today and he remains one of the most memorable dogs in history.


